# Emergency Pine Beetle Response Act of 2024 Section-by-Section Summary

### **Assistance for Private Landowners**

- Cost-share payments to landowners to cover 85 percent of the cost to implement "outbreak response measures."
- Eligible measures include, but are not limited to: timber harvesting or thinning, prescribed burning, debris removal, insecticide treatment, establishment of buffer areas, and any other activity the Secretary deems necessary to respond to pine beetle infestations.

### **Incentives for Timber Service Businesses**

- Cost-share payments to "timber service businesses" to cover 50 percent of itemized costs associated with working on sites affected by pine beetles.
- Applies to any business that derives gross revenue from cutting or transporting timber, or inspecting, planting, pruning, or removing trees from residential or commercial areas.
- Eligible costs covered are expenses incurred by a timber service business in carrying out contractual services associated with outbreak response measures, such as:
  - o Labor or hours for truck drivers or equipment operators;
  - Mileage or hours for use of equipment, such as transports, bulldozers, and skidders; and
  - o Materials, such as gravel, grass seed, culverts and mats.

## **Streamlined Delivery Process**

- Authorizes USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) County Office Committees to administer program assistance immediately following drought designations and confirmed pine beetle infestations.
- Existing USDA programs require authorization from the FSA National Office, which can be burdensome and time-consuming.

### **Advanced Financing for Landowners**

- Makes impacted landowners eligible for USDA Emergency Loans in order to provide them with immediate access to financing to cover the costs of necessary actions following a pine beetle outbreak.
- Upon receipt of a cost-share payment, landowners would have the option to apply it to the remaining principal of their loan.

### **Grants to State, Tribal, and Local Governments**

 Would authorized the Secretary of Agriculture to award grants directly to State and local governments to aid in the response to, and repair damage caused by pine beetle outbreaks.
